Feeding the Need

Since March 2020, United Way and Halifax Urban Ministries have been coordinated 435 volunteers to pack over 59,845 bags of food for those impacted by Covid-19. STORIES OF IMPACT



Family Life Center Due to COVID-19 the Family Life Center implemented a new way for victims to reach them without being overheard verbalizing their need for help - texting.

A victim in crisis can now text an advocate 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Tasha, a physically and emotionally abused woman, reached out through text and got help. She safely arrived at the emergency shelter with her children. She was unemployed, had no transportation, no familial support and was nearly penniless. Slowly, Tasha began to feel empowered and supported by the advocates she confided in daily. Within a couple of months, Tasha found employment, acquired her motor vehicle learner's permit and began mending the damaged relationships with her family.

> Anna, an unemployed single mother was homeless. Moving from one friend or relative's couch to another with her toddler and newborn, she finally had enough. She reached out to Family Renew Community and

they helped by providing safety and shelter, assisting in her search for employment and daycare for her children, and teaching her how to budget and save. She is now working and has been accepted to the Medical Assisting Program at Daytona State College and today she is able to provide for her family and is renting a duplex in Flagler County.
