





## Financial Stability

"Home for Christmas"

A homeless family of 5 was identified through the Volusia/Flagler County Coalition for the Homeless' Coordinated Outreach Entry Program (CEOP) funded by the United Way of Volusia-Flagler Counties. With the help of CEOP staff, multiple agencies worked together to find various housing resource grant funding for first and last month rent, a security deposit, and utility deposits in order to place this family into a home just days before Christmas. CEOP staff continue to follow up with the family's Individual Treatment Plan which includes maintaining employment, remaining in stable housing, and receiving referrals to resources.



## Health

"A New Hope"

Tonya\*, a victim of human trafficking, was referred to Stewart-Marchman Act Behavioral Healthcare's Rape Crisis program. The advocate assigned to her case completed a Victim Compensation claim and partnered with the FBI to apply for assistance for human trafficking on her behalf. The woman was living with an abusive partner, was off her medication, and abused drugs. Through the Rape Crisis program, she began to receive therapy, moved into a sober living facility away from the abuser, is back on a medication schedule, and is currently attending 12 step meetings. She is able to use public transportation to travel to her new part-time position at a call center. Beyond her independence, Tonya also gained a new hope for her life.
